

Charles Weijer, M.D., Ph.D.

Dr. Weijer is Canada Research Chair and Associate Professor of Philosophy, Medicine, and Epidemiology and Biostatistics at the University of Western Ontario in London, Ontario, Canada. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Alberta, and his Ph.D. degree in experimental medicine from McGill University in Montreal, Quebec. Following graduate work at McGill University with philosopher Benjamin Freedman, Dr. Weijer joined Mount Sinai Hospital as its first clinical ethicist in 1996. In 1998 he was recruited by the Department of Bioethics at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Dr. Weijer's appointment as Visiting Scholar in the Department of History and Philosophy of Science at the University of Cambridge from 2003 to 2004 allowed him to develop his interests in the philosophy of science. In 2005 he assumed a Tier I Canada Research Chair in Philosophy at the University of Western Ontario. Dr. Weijer has published extensively on the ethical analysis of research benefits and harms, protection of communities in research, and standards in international research. His articles have appeared in leading bioethics, law, science, and medicine journals and have been widely cited. Dr. Weijer's research career has been supported by a succession of salary awards and research grants from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. He has had a substantial impact on international research ethics policy through collaborations with the World Medical Association, Council for International Organizations of Medical Sciences, and U.S. National Bioethics Advisory Commission. In 2002 Dr. Weijer was elected as a Fellow of the Hastings Center for his distinguished contributions to the field of bioethics. In 2003 he was made a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada for his accomplishments as a medical scientist.
